COORDINATOR'S CORNER

You may have wondered what happened to your newsletter! Because of new projects, weather, and other matters, I wasn't able to send out a winter newsletter. You have my apologies! This has been a very busy year!

We have had two staff changes this spring. Penny Streeter, our Student/Tutor Coordinator, has resigned because of health reasons. We miss her, and we send her our best wishes. Also, Lenette Weinman, SELF Family Literacy Program Coordinator, will no longer be with us as of June 30 because of funding being eliminated for that local program. We will also miss Lenette, but we hope to see her in a new position with daycare providers.

In the fall we received a grant from Gov. Rendell's Initiative for the Adult Education Impact Program for Adult Basic and Literacy Education. This grant has been used to set up small groups in Troy and Towanda and also to begin a new curriculum with the Cargill ESL classes. This grant has been a lot of work, but we are beginning to see progress with those learners who have been involved in intensive tutoring and the new ESL curriculum. More hours of instruction per week equals more progress!

In addition to the new grant and setting up small groups, we offered a pre-clinical Certified Nurse Attendant (CNA) training this spring. The class received a lot of response. Sigrid

“Discovering the World of Reading” will be the theme of this year’s Recognition Banquet, which will be held on Thursday, June 19, at 6PM at the Towanda Elks. The guest speaker will be the Hon. Bill Goodling, former US Representative.

The Honorable Bill Goodling fulfilled his pledge to put “people before politics,” which his constituent service and legislative record made clear. “Congressman Bill” as he will always be known, continues to put people before politics. This philosophy helped him effectively serve the residents of Adams, Cumberland, and York Counties in the 19th Congressional District for twenty-six years. While in Congress, Goodling

served on the Committee on Education and Labor and chaired the House Committee on Education and the Workforce. Since his retirement, he has taken a new role as Senior Advisor at B&D Consulting. Goodling also works to promote the efforts of the Goodling Institute for Research in Family Literacy located at Penn State University and the William F. Goodling Advanced Skills Center in York, PA. He serves as a Board Member of the following organizations: National Center for Family Literacy, Junior Achievement, Easter Seals, York Foundation, PA Coalition for Children, University of Phoenix, PreK Now, and the Pennsylvania Horse Breeders Association.

This year again through a partnership with Partners in Family and Community Development, the Literacy Program is able to provide complimentary dinners for volunteer tutors and students. INCREASING INTENSITY

In an effort to increase intensity of instruction with its adult literacy students, the Literacy Program has offered two small groups during '07-'08. A small group on math and budgeting met in Towanda. Marie Pierce and Sherry Spencer facilitated that small group. Cathy Guffey from Penn State Cooperative Extension Service presented budgeting for several weeks.

Also a pre-GED small group has been meeting in Troy. Dolores Anthony has been the volunteer tutor for this small group. Jonell Foster also helped with this small group.

The students who participated in these small groups were able to meet with a "one to one" tutor for three hours a week and also attend the small group for three hours a week. When reality became evident, several were unable to attend for six hours. With families and work schedules, six hours was a goal, but not everyone was able to meet for that amount of time.

Vicki Vannan, ESL instructor, used a new curriculum with the ESL class at Cargill this year. Gail Weinstein's Learners' Lives as Curriculum was the focus for this year's class at Cargill. The adult learners focused not only on speaking English, but also writing in English and what it means to be part of a community.

The ESL learners are preparing for their final project which will be participating in the Laceyville Community Days with a food booth. Under Vicki's direction, the adult learners will select items to make, make these items, store the items, prepare signage, man and operate the

food booth during the hours of 1PM – 3PM. They will be part of the Laceyville Community Days and part of the Laceyville Community!

The learners in both the small groups and the ESL class have made progress as shown in their post test scores. Intensity of instruction makes a big difference! These small groups were funded by the Governor's Initiative for Impact Services for Adult Basic and Literacy Education.
